

### Research Guidelines

- 1) Determine what area (mode of analysis) and/or object of study (play or theatrical era) you are interested in.
- 2) Using the databases of journals available to you via Chaffey's Library (online resources) or other peer-reviewed journals, select a scholarly article on the subject or theoretical lens you have identified. Login to MyChaffey- and click on "Library Resources" - then click on "Other Library Resources." You will have to login, again, when you choose a database. "Jstor" is an excellent database of journals in the areas of Humanities, History, Area Studies, and more.
- 3) Print the article and annotate the article as you read it. (You can print for free in the Chaffey Library or in the Arts Resource Room in CA-A).
- 4) In paragraph form, using MLA formatting, summarize the author's argument and what the essay is about. This should be no more than 150 words. At the top of the page- list your name, this class, date, project, my name. Use in-text citation to identify the essay title, journal, and author.

- 5) You will turn in to your instructor A) an annotated copy of the article/essay and B) your paragraph that summarizes the argument and the subject of the essay (see #3).
